

Access to research literature

Academics, researchers, students and policy makers in 22 countries across Sub-Saharan Africa, South Asia and Latin America have access to many thousands of online journals and books, in full text, free at the point of use.



Access is managed by your library/institution which:

- Pays for access where relevant, often by joining INASP's in-country partner consortium
- Registers your institution for access, most often as automatically authenticated access through a campus network or in rare cases by user name and password

What is available?

INASP and your consortium negotiate for deeply discounted, sometimes free, access to online research literature across a variety of disciplines for eligible institutions in many countries. How to get access

- ✓ Talk to your librarian or equivalent to see if your institution is already registered for access.
- ✓ If your institution is not registered, check if you are eligible for access. INASP's eligibility criteria extends to non-profit, non-public research and education institutions. This includes university departments and libraries, Higher Education institutions, research institutions, parliamentary libraries and government ministries and offices. - ✓ If your institution is eligible for access, have your librarian or equivalent contact your in-country consortium to become a member. Contact details for your consortium can be found on INASP's country pages: **www.inasp.info/en/network**

- ✓ Once your institution has become a member of the consortium, your librarian or equivalent will be able to register for access to resources on the INASP registration system: **www.inasp.info/en/accounts/login**

- Researchers are able to use evidence and reference the most current thinking in research papers and journal articles
- Researchers are able to build their research proposals on existing research
- Academics are able to refer to the most current research in their teaching and student reading lists
- Librarian and academics can collaborate fully in the preparation of course materials
- Policymakers are able to develop strong and appropriate policies based on supporting research evidence within their field
